Making in Happen in Hastings – A summary Starting during the pandemic, when people were living in separate bubbles from each other; Making it Happen, like all businesses and organisations, had to learn how to engage with individuals in less traditional ways. Zoom meetings became commonplace, gradually loosening up into outdoor meetings, but it took some time to reach what felt more normal and natural when gathering together into groups.



During the first year the Hastings project supported projects linked to supporting communities affected by the Covid pandemic. Food hampers, art equipment, mobile phones, outdoor exercise and outdoor Christmas activities were funded with small grants.

As the world opened up, the project was more able to hold more face-to-face community conversations and support more individuals with their seeds of an idea. Photography, art and creative activities, friendship groups, wellbeing and environmental groups were funded and supported.

The successful event that happened on the pier in 2022, supporting the cultural diversity that Palestine offers and supporting our local links with the town of Al Mawasi, now takes on new significance.

Groups that have focussed on engaging young people have been supported to hold skate events, and MiH has helped to sustain a bike repair workshop. Summer sessions to learn woodworking skills and kickboxing have also been funded.

Making it Happen has hosted the Hastings Youth Partnership regularly, providing opportunities for organisations working with children and young people to link knowledge and ideas, to back our younger residents.

Recycling, re-purposing and lending useful equipment has burgeoned from a small idea to a sustainable project offering a regular service for learning skills and borrowing kit.

Groups working with inclusion as a focus have received grants that have supported their continued development and growth. These include LGBTQ+, neurodiverse and global majority folk together with gender focussed projects.

Activity bringing inter-generational individuals together has developed in ways that were not envisioned; such as responding to challenges in accessing heritage and countryside. Offering children a chance to learn an instrument has changed lives, increased confidence and expanded horizons.

Projects to encourage community involvement in sustaining local green spaces, gardens and growing food have been enabled to buy equipment and to offer networking and developmental activities to help with this.

Resident focussed associations have been funded to bring people together around their neighbourhoods; and to act as a conduit to local housing providers.



Spaces have been cleared, developed, planted and maintained bringing a sense of community and safety to residents, children and families.

Over the last five years, the neighbourhood focus of the Making it Happen project has allowed groups and organisations to work together, whilst retaining their identities. It has encouraged the small seeds of ideas to flourish into a variety of initiatives in specific areas of the town; but has also enabled connections across the borough that will help sustain the activities in the longer term. **'Thank you'** for making it happen & being a vital thread in the patchwork of local communities lastings Voluntary Action

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
